

Recent Facts & Statistics on Drug Use, Homelessness and Overdose

Overdose

- Overdose deaths have increased in Massachusetts amid COVID-19¹.
- ◆ 1,967 opioid-related overdose deaths confirmed and estimated in Massachusetts in the first nine months of 2020².
- Methamphetamine and cocaine found to be the next most common attributers to overdose.
- ♦ This represents a 2% increase compared to the same time period in 2019.
- Reports show people of color being disproportionately impacted by overdose compared to non-Hispanic whites.
- ♦ Reentry populations are one of the highest risk group for fatal overdose (BMC OBAT).

Homelessness & More

- ◆ The City of Boston 2020 Homeless Census reported a total of 6,192 individuals experiencing homelessness, including an 8 percent increase in family homelessness from 2019³.
- Homeless populations have been disproportionately affected by the opioid epidemic and are at higher risk for fatal opioid overdose⁴.
- Boston Public Health Commission reported this month an uptick in cases of HIV among people who inject drugs. Many of those are individuals currently experiencing homelessness⁵.
- BMC's Office-Based Addiction Treatment program distributed more than 200 phones to ensure continuity of care for those in need during the pandemic.
